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PRINCIPAL'S SPEECH

Mr. Chairman, Dr. Florida-James, parents and friends, governors, teachers and pupils, past and present, of Limavady Grammar School, it gives me great pleasure to present my report on the academic year 2017 -2018 at Limavady Grammar.

At the start of 2017 -18 academic year we were joined by a number of teachers including; Mrs. Yeates (Head of RE Department), Miss McDonagh (Biology), Mr. Parke (Technology), Miss Moore (History) and Miss Linton (Chemistry). We are indebted to these teachers and I want to thank them for the contribution they have individually made to our school, both inside and outside the classroom. I would also like to thank our temporary teachers last year who covered a range of maternity and temporary posts.

I would like to reiterate Mr. Alcorn's thanks to our leaving staff. We have said farewell to Mrs. McCluskey who retired after 37 years of service to LGS and to Mr. Nash who was with us for six years. I would like to wish our permanent and temporary leaving staff best wishes for the future, whether that is retirement or to pursue their career in pastures new.

This has been a year of unprecedented challenges in

education, a continued lack of political direction in Northern Ireland, a lack of strategic decision- making and further cuts have led to a crisis in the education sector. Quite simply, this cannot continue. It is our children in all of our schools, primary, post-primary and special schools, who are suffering due to lack of access to front-line services and a lack of appropriate investment and strategic planning for their future. I would urge our politicians to carefully consider the role for which they were elected. Step up and do your job! In our school, pupils from different backgrounds work together every single day to achieve success. It's a pity the elected political leaders in our country cannot do the same.

In spite of this, we have continued to work hard to improve the educational outcomes for the children in our care. Staff continually go the extra mile to ensure that each child achieves their best. We aim to challenge our children to achieve more than they ever thought possible. We pride ourselves on high-quality learning and teaching which challenges young minds, stimulates curiosity and leads to high standards of academic achievement. I am delighted to report that we have certainly been successful in doing so. This year our A Level results, matched the excellent results of the previous year, with the overall pass rate being above the Northern Ireland average, reaching 99% for the 317 examinations sat. 59% of all grades at A level were at B or above. Motivated pupils, hard-working, professional teachers and a caring environment all provide a recipe for success.

Top achievers at A Level were Ciaran Duffy, Nicole Kingsbury and Callum McCurry who each received 4 A* grades. Samantha Coulter and Lyndsey Lynch achieved 3 A* grades. Other top achievers included Stefan Deery, Zoe Kyte, Matthew Lockhead, Christopher McKee, Jack O'Neill and Owen Sortwell, who each achieved 3 or more A to A* grades.

As a result of hard work and determination, 92% of our Upper 6th pupils have gone on to pursue further and higher education. I am pleased to announce a new award this year, The Martin King French and Ingram Bursary for Law. This bursary has been awarded to the top student who studies Law at university.

At AS level, the trend continues to push upwards with our year 13 students producing the best results in the last 4 years, with 83.5% of all



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entries being at A to C. Of the 376 exams sat, almost 40% resulted in A grades, with 22 pupils achieving the top grade in 3 or more subjects. Joel Boucher, Victoria Brown, Rhiannon Day, Adam Douglas, Ryan Duffy, Kornel Gorywoda, David Irwin, Rachel McAleese, Sophie McArthur, Matthew Nichol, Bevin Reilly, Ethan Squires, Finn Whiteside and Stephanie Wilson each achieved A grades in all of their 4 subjects.

At GCSE level, results are impressive with 30 students awarded 7 or more A* to A grades and over 69% of all grades awarded being at A* to B level. 475 of all grades awarded were A to A* grades.

I am exceedingly proud of all our students who undertook GCSE, AS and A levels last year, in some cases against a background of difficult personal circumstances. A teacher has a very privileged position; to be able to make a difference when things go wrong. That's one of the reasons why we all entered the profession. This was the case for some of our students last year. Together we worked to overcome adversity and achieve success. To those students in particular, very well done!

It is our role as a school to provide an environment where our students can excel academically as well as

developing a range of other talents. The wealth of extra-curricular activities on offer sets us apart from other schools. The learning that takes place on a sports field, school trip or music performance is equally important as that which takes place in the classroom. We promote, amongst other qualities, leadership, diligence, resilience, respect, compassion and tolerance. We were delighted to receive a new award last year from the Past Pupils' Association for the pupil who most embodies the school ethos as well as the McKee Cup for the overall voluntary contribution to school life. These awards represent the value we place on the extracurricular life of the school.

I am going to outline briefly some of the events and successes from last year. There is much more detail relating to the events of last year in the school magazine and I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Warwick and his team for this wonderful production and thank you to all our sponsors who continue to support us.

Our school aim, Learning, Caring and Preparing for Life, is central to all we do in LGS.

Sur Yon, the Technology visit to Munich, the Sixth Form French trip to Brussels, the Duke of Edinburgh expeditions and the rugby trips to the Aviva Stadium, all provided learning opportunities, some of them unforgettable! The STEM Module came to visit us as part of our Science and Technology provision. Sentinus has provided a range of career-based workshops to enable our pupils to make better-informed career decisions.

During the last year, pupils participated in a range of clubs and societies at lunchtime and after school, including Pottery and Textiles, STEM, Computing, Technology, Modern Languages, Charity, Board Games, 180, Study Club, Surfing and Photography. The winners of our school photography competition were Amy Henry, Emma Loughery, Cait Colhoun and Alix Hull. Well done, ladies! In the UK Maths Challenge, 26 Bronze, 15 Silver and 1 Gold certificate were achieved and, in a separate Maths Challenge event, over £156 was raised for Children in Crossfire.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is an important part of life in school. During the year, 11 Gold and 24 Silver Awards were gained by pupils, past and present, with 171 students currently involved in the scheme.

The Music Department provides opportunities for the pupils to develop and refine their talents and love of music. With groups such as the Junior Choir, Senior Choir, Beginners' Guitar, Concert Band, String Orchestra, Traditional Group and the Ukulele Orchestra, there is something for everyone. The Music Department led us in our annual Christmas Concert and, after Easter, we enjoyed a range of musical talent in our Spring Concert. This year we have significantly invested in music and have equipped the Music Department with a suite of Apple Macs to further the development of Music Technology in the school. This year we are also looking forward to a whole school music and drama production of "Back to the 80's". Get your 80's perms and legwarmers ready!

Charity and giving to others form an important part of our school ethos. Pupils in our junior school English classes raised £2030 in our annual Readathon, now called Read for Good. This brings our school total of funds raised for this charity to £79,349 since records began. The money raised helps pay for new books for children in the Royal Belfast Hospital for Sick Children as well as storyteller visits. Throughout the year a number of charity events took place and money was donated to a variety of charities, including Operation Christmas Child, the Salvation Army, St Vincent de Paul, Save the Children and the Cancer Fund for Children.

School life is busy with pupils competing in cricket, rugby, hockey, netball, athletics, tennis, cross country, swimming and football. With approximately 40 teams on offer, from a variety of sports, there is no excuse not to get involved at LGS! Last year, the U14A hockey team reached the semi-final of the Junior Ulster Cup – which ranks them in the top four in Ulster. The Medallion

rugby team reached the final of the Medallion Bowl competition and the First XI cricketers were Ulster Schools' Cup semi-finalists, again placing them in the top four in Ulster! Our intermediate netball players were winners of the Coleraine and District League. Our athletes show great potential with the Year 8 boys' team winning the Bishops Athletics series event and being crowned Ulster Schools Team Champions. Mr. Alcorn has already mentioned some of the individual successes. There are too many sporting achievements to name today. Follow us on Facebook or Twitter to keep up to date with what is happening.

All of the activities I have mentioned so far would not happen without the dedication, commitment and enthusiasm of staff, coaches and parent helpers. I would like you to join me in showing our appreciation for all the hard work that our staff, coaches and parents do outside the classroom to provide our pupils with a vast range of extra-curricular activities.

On a personal level, I would like to thank the Senior Leadership team and the Board of Governors for their support and guidance throughout the year, Mrs. Mullan and her team in the office for making everything run so smoothly and the Parents Association for their hard work and commitment, organizing events such as the Fun Run, the Craft Fair and the unforgettable Year Eight Social. A final thank you goes to the members of

I am pleased to report that Limavady Grammar, along with Rossmar Special School, St Patrick's, Dungiven, and Gaelcholaiste Dhoire have been successful in securing Peace IV Sharing Education Funding to develop Music Technology with our Year 8 pupils. This is an exciting venture and, together, we look forward to nurturing musical talent within our students.

Reflecting on the outgoing year, much has been achieved in the areas of Learning and Teaching, Curriculum, Pastoral and Staff Development. We have listened to the voice of our students in the Students' Council. There have been many changes in school over the past year - without change and challenge, we rust. Great things never came from comfort zones. With the support of the Governors, our school is changing and adapting to be responsive to the needs of our students. Pastoral care structures have changed alongside the offer of wider curriculum choice at GCSE and A level. Our school continues to be hugely oversubscribed with applications for Year 8 and other year groups. 


On Thursday 20th September 2018, my GCSE Art & Design class and I went to see Nicola Nemec's exhibition, 'Quiet Places' at the Flowerfield Arts Centre, Portstewart.

It was my first time at this gallery. The setting is very special in a quiet area of the town, with a park in the front lawn area. We noticed several pieces of sculpture in the grass. We were able to view the exhibition, listen to Nicola talk about her work and ask her questions.

Nicola had many pieces of art work- all paintings, mostly of landscapes- that she had created over 18 months. When she creates her art work she likes to use photographs as references : however, she does not copy, she paints from memory. This makes her pieces more emotive. This practice takes years to master! It enables her to make her work unique, very different from simply copying from a photograph. She likes to make multiple pieces of the same area because of the different seasons, weather and atmosphere.

She starts off with washes on a high- quality canvas and grinds pigments and oil paints together to make her own colours. She tries to build up layers that reflect the landscape from her memories over the years, giving her work a certain depth and softness. She finds using bright colours very challenging, especially red. Nicola's favourite medium is acrylic spray on boards. She starts off the landscapes with bright colours, oranges and reds, and paints over darker colours to create the layered look. If she wants



to change anything, she sands down the painting and repaints over the top of it.

Nicola comes originally from Belfast, where she went to secondary school and had many happy experiences looking at art exhibitions at the Ulster Museum- this is where her inspiration and passion for art originated. Her main inspirational figures were the poets Seamus Heaney and WB Yeats, and the artists Martha Graham, Francis Bacon and T.P. Flannagan (the Fermanagh artist's work is similar to her work).

I found this trip was very enjoyable, a great opportunity to meet and ask an artist lots of questions. I was inspired by Nicola and her work. Thanks to Mrs Lowth for organising this Art trip.



14 Year 12 students from LGS, accompanied by Mrs Sánchez and Ms McGrattan, set off on the first part of their Spanish Exchange. After a bus trip to Dublin and a short plane journey, we arrived in Madrid, the capital of Spain, where we went on an open bus tour around the historical part of the city. We enjoyed sites such as the Puerta del Sol, the Retiro Park, the Prado Museum, the Bernabeu Football Stadium and even had lunch in the very busy and cosmopolitan Plaza Mayor. It was very interesting to see and find out about Madrid's extensive history.

On Sunday 28th October 2018,

In the evening, we set off in another bus to Santa Cruz de Mudela, where our partners and their families were waiting for us. Although we had already been in contact with them and had started forming relationships, it was very exciting to meet everyone in person!

Our second day was definitely one of the most eventful. We were warmly welcomed by the staff and pupils at their school, I.E.S. Máximo Laguna, where we were treated to a traditional breakfast consisting of cake and hot chocolate. We were then taught a dance by some of the pupils at the school to a popular Spanish song. Afterwards, we visited the Town Hall : we had a meeting with the Mayoress, followed by a treasure hunt around all the notable monuments in Santa Cruz de Mudela. It was one of the most memorable activities of the week, as we began to get to know our partners and their friends and interact with them.

On our third day, we experienced

a lesson about the classic Spanish novel *Don Quijote de la Mancha*. This was quite significant to our trip, as many of the places we visited were based around this book. During our trip to the historical town of Almagro, we visited the National Theatre Museum and the *Corral de Comedias* (the Spanish equivalent of the Globe Theatre). It was fascinating to learn about Spanish literature and history in that way and, despite the rain, everyone really enjoyed it.

On our return to school, we were invited to eat the traditional Spanish dish, paella. Admittedly, it was not our favourite meal, but we gave it a go anyway. Then came the evening and one of our favourite parts of the entire week. We helped the Spanish students turn their school into a Halloween 'Tunnel of Horror' and then dressed up as scary characters in preparation for the evening performance. We had a lot of fun doing this, as we met so many pupils from the school, some of whom were not even on the exchange. We also managed our first proper Spanish conversations and although this was challenging, we felt a great sense of achievement.

On the 31st of October we visited Toledo, the so-called City of the Three Cultures, due to the mixture of Christian, Muslim and Jewish influence in the city's past. We went on a tram tour around the city, which took us to a viewing point

to enjoy the amazing views of the entire city and the surrounding River Tajo. We also saw the impressive Gothic cathedral, the Alcázar and the Monastery of San Juan de los Reyes. Afterwards, we were given free time to do some shopping and to try the traditional Spanish treat, churros. The visit to Toledo was definitely one of the highlights of the trip for us.

The next day we visited the Montesinos cave and hiked around the Ruidera Lakes National Park. Despite the uphill climb, the stunning views at the top were definitely worth it! We finished the day with a short visit to the town of Villanueva de los Infantes, a town renowned for its splendid 17th Century architecture.

We spent Friday getting to know the Santa Cruz and its surroundings. We initially visited one of the many wineries in the region, Bodegas Fernando Castro. It was very interesting to see how much work goes into making a bottle of wine! We were then taken to see a quaint chapel with beautiful frescos and, afterwards, a very special bullring,

not only because it's one of the oldest in Spain, but also because of its peculiar shape; it was square! Following a picnic in Las Alamedas, we set off to the Viso del Marqués Palace, where we learnt all about the life and military victories of don Álvaro de Bazán, a Spanish admiral.

Saturday was our last full day of the trip and was spent with our Spanish partners and their families. It was sad because we knew we were leaving the next day and we would not see our friends again until April.

Overall, we are so glad we took part in this exchange as we have formed many friendships: we have also great memories and had experiences that will stay with us forever. Our Spanish was improved, and we have a newfound respect for Spanish culture. 

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



We definitely learnt the importance of being organised as we had to make sure every prop was looked after and to ensure it was in its designated place and nowhere else!



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



HIGHLIGHTS : JUNIOR SKI TRIP TO ANDALO, ITALY, FEBRUARY 2019

The wind rushed mercilessly through my hair, as I sped down the glistening, pearly white piste, spinning around other skiers, and coasting round corners with a satisfying whoosh. Building up speed, I felt as though I was going at least forty miles per hour, with tunnel vision through my tinted goggles, only truly focusing on my crystal white endpoint. The sky was an endless blue, seemingly stretching out to infinity, over the vast green trees, and to where it met the summits of Andalo's magnificent peaks. I had learned how to do a cool, "James-Bond" stop, by turning myself to the side, and ploughing snow up from the ground, like something out of an action movie involving skiing, before awkwardly waddling through the gates to eagerly fly up the lifts once more.

One of the main reasons I was excited to jet off to Italy was for the picturesque views and scenic landscapes, but I most definitely was not expecting it to be as breathtaking as it was. When we arrived in Verona, we explored the alluring city, taking photographs at every point, just like typical tourists: afterwards, we gazed in awe at the old buildings, before being allowed to roam around in groups to get something to eat, and explore, before meeting up and travelling to Andalo. And so, because my friend group is so multicultural, what better place to dine in than McDonald's? Another point where I was completely in love with the scenery was on the first morning of the ski trip, in our hotel room, when I drew back the curtains, revealing a spectacular view of snow-capped mountains, a deep blue sky and a beautiful village. We only think that we have real mountains in Northern Ireland!

I had some trouble getting used to the ski lifts. Once, as I was supposed to jump off at the end, I got my ski pole caught in the snow, and as the ski lift ploughed forward, it bent right

in half, leaving me with an almostbroken pole, so when I hopped off at the top, a friend of mine took a video of us all in hysterics about it. But when I was told that I had to go without them --that's when the laughter stopped: and going down without ski poles... that was definitely terrifying as it was only the second day! I'd actually reached the bottom successfully without falling, and then on the way back up again, can you imagine how funny it was when I heard a distinct call of my name from behind me, only to turn and see that same friend, Jayla, with not one, but two broken ski poles. Let's just say, our instructor was not entirely pleased. We did pretty well without the ski poles! And, regarding the whole situation, we kept it quiet from Mrs McFarland, paid for the broken ski poles, kept our heads down, and told her absolutely nothing of it, until now, that is. Sorry Miss!

Near the start of the trip, as an afterdinner activity, we trekked down to the leisure centre, and went into the arcade where there were different game machines and pool tables, but the activities which stood out most in that arcade, involved the cars. They were little child- size go-karts, with electric engines, sat on top of a basic oval- shaped race track. Mr Parke, Mr Irwin and Mr Laird decided to have a race. They paid their tokens, then plonked themselves each onto a different coloured far-too-small gokart, before taking off on the count of three, and whizzing around the tiny track. Can you imagine the strange looks of confusion the Italians gave us as three grown men played on children's cars? I'll never be able to take those three seriously after what I've witnessed!

On the second night after dinner, we walked back over to the leisure centre, only this time, we had the intention of going ice skating. We got suited and booted, before stepping onto the ice, and after a few slips and falls, and some tutoring from the doctor who came with us, I went zooming around that rink with my friends. Until my friend, Olivia, told me that she could do a jump on the iceand she did. So, I decided to give it a shot. I started skating, moving faster, pushed up - SLIP, BANG, CRASH! - It didn't really work out in my favour.

Our ski instructor wasn't...the best ski instructor. Don't get me wrong, he was nice - if you made absolutely no mistakes whatsoever and skied like a professional even though it was only our second day of skiing. His favourite thing to do was shout... and I admit, it is pretty hilarious to hear a Russian man screeching about how we weren't, "Making a curve!" or how we were, "Going far, far, far too fast!" He sounded rather like Gru, from Despicable Me, when I think back on it. He often mixed up names, but the funniest was when my friend, Karen, was called many names, ranging from Kiera, to Carol, and Conan. You'd be skiing down the slopes and just hear a thick Russian accent screaming, "Kiera! What are you doing?" or, "Carol! Slow down!" and the funniest of all, "CONAN! Do you want to die! Because if you hit your head, it's over!" Something I learned, is that if he knew your name, it was a bad sign- the good news for me was, he didn't know mine!

There was a point when someone in my ski group had toppled over, and could not get up, and we were at a particularly steep point on the slope: so he picked her up, and then told us that we had to slide down. Now, that sounds way more fun than it is. It's not sliding down where you sit down like on a slide, and have a joyful time just slipping down the little mountain. Oh no: this sliding is where you turn your skis sideways, completely vulnerable to falling, and tilt your skis down the hill, so you just edge downwards with every shuffle, often slipping too far, and then panicking about it, before regaining

While writing this, I'm really enjoying reminiscing- it brings a smile to my face. When someone asks me about the ski trip, I always have so much to say about how amazing it was. I intend to go on the Senior Ski Trip in a few years, and I think that if you have the chance to go on this amazing journey, you should **definitely** take this opportunity. I **SO** want to go back to Italy, or to ski anywhere, because I loved it so much. And if you're reading this while considering going on the ski trip, please go on it! You'll make memories with friends, and even make new friends!

I'd also like to take this opportunity to thank all of the people who made this trip possible, especially Mrs McFarland, and all of the teachers, including Mr Laird who managed to not lose my passport when I was in his travel group (*because I would have lost it if I had to hold onto it*), and Mrs Louden for when she was in our ski group - *there were lots of laughs!* Also, thanks to my friends, who were such great company on this amazing journey!


3rd XV


This was a fitting end to a great season with a terrific bunch of lads. This team, if they can keep their team mentality and continue to develop, will have a great future in schools rugby and beyond.

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
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
