

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RETIREMENT



Having been educated at Lurgan College and UUC, Stephen began working in the Geography department at LGS in 1987. He quickly learned the ropes under the tutelage of John Armstrong, rapidly establishing himself as a most conscientious and popular member of staff.

It was obvious, even during those early days, that Stephen was someone who was willing to give his time very willingly to any number of extra-curricular pursuits. He assisted with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme for many years, playing an invaluable role in helping pupils to achieve success. Stephen coached various school rugby teams and undertook his refereeing duties on many cold, wet Saturday mornings with unfailing good humour. If a teacher was unavailable for any trip or activity, Stephen could always be counted on to help: for instance, he stepped in to facilitate the famous Rock School trip to Bradford in the late '80s when others quailed in the face of such a demanding responsibility, and, of course, he managed this venture with his usual panache. As Head of Athletics, in addition to coaching and organising events, Stephen displayed the ability to identify pupils' athletic potential. Most obviously, he was instrumental in encouraging Paralympics Gold Medallist and World Champion Jason Smyth to focus on sprinting, thus helping to lay the foundation for a glorious career.

Stephen revelled in the camaraderie of the staffroom, where his conviviality, sense of humour and quick wit enlivened many a break or lunchtime.

He possessed the highly unusual ability of being able to quote, verbatim, huge chunks of Shakespeare's "Othello" at apposite moments during conversation. He was greatly respected, liked and trusted by his colleagues for his integrity and unfailing modesty. In the barren decades before their recent triumphs, Stephen flew the flag unflinchingly and proudly as the solitary Manchester City supporter among the staff, testament indeed to his strength of character. A most talented sportsman, Stephen enthusiastically attended every staff golf outing, relishing the crack and contributing mightily to it, alongside his friends such as Ken Mawhinney, the late Geoff Clarke and Alan Bogle. You'll have the opportunity to lower that handicap now, Stephen! He was by some distance the best footballer among his colleagues, having played for several years at Irish League standard as an elegant, skilled midfielder. In the days when LGS fielded a staff team to play against teachers from other schools and hosted five-a-side football every Friday after school in the Sports Hall, Stephen's talent shone brightly for all to see and admire.

Both of his children, Gillian and David, attended LGS and were an absolute credit to Stephen and his wife, Joan. They achieved great academic success and were heavily involved in the extra-curricular life of the school, but also left a lasting impression on the staff and their peers due to their excellent behaviour and lively, engaging personalities.

In the classroom, Stephen's professional approach and total dedication to helping his pupils to fulfil their ability earned him the respect and affection of his students. They were inspired by Stephen's love of Geography, by his innovative approaches to learning and by his hunger to refresh and enhance his knowledge of his subject: after more than three decades of teaching, Stephen still undertook online courses to ensure that his material

for teaching was at the cutting edge. After Alan Bogle's retirement, Stephen proved himself to be a most efficient and capable Head of Geography, to no-one's surprise. Despite the pressures of the job, he always made time to chat with, advise and assist his colleagues.

As Head of Careers, Stephen's commitment to helping his students to prepare and make careful, informed choices for the next stage in their lives seemed to be limitless. He was instrumental in introducing Career Days for Junior pupils to encourage them to develop their awareness of the multiplicity of career opportunities awaiting them in later years. As an interviewer, he exhibited the ability to listen sensitively to Senior students, giving them the benefit of his vast knowledge and helping them to make the subject and course choices which would best facilitate them in fulfilling their aspirations. It speaks volumes for Stephen's unwavering devotion to the pupils that every August he would be in school when the A level results were announced: then, day after day, he would make himself available to talk to pupils and make countless phone calls to ensure that every single person would be able to pursue their career aspirations whether in tertiary education or employment come September. Furthermore, in the event of a pupil needing to sit a test or exam to secure an interview or offer from a university or college, Stephen would make the arrangements and come in to invigilate the exam himself during his Halloween holiday. He expected no acclaim for this from anyone -indeed, almost no-one was aware of it: and that is typical of his selfless, unassuming approach to his work.

In short, Stephen Robb embodies the very best qualities of our profession. He will be sorely missed at LGS. Stephen, we wish you a long, healthy and happy retirement.

PRINCIPAL'S SPEECH

Mr Chairman, Dr Peace, parents and friends, governors, teachers and pupils, past and present, of Limavady Grammar School: it gives me great pleasure to present my report on the academic year 2018 -2019 at Limavady Grammar.

It's hard to believe that we are in the same political situation in Northern Ireland as this time last year with a crisis in the education sector due to lack of funding and leadership at a governmental level. Over the past year this has had an impact on us on a daily basis, with a lack of strategic decision making in education, less access to frontline services to support our young people and a funding formula that simply does not work for schools and which needs urgent review. We still continue to do our job as well as we can but we are doing it by ourselves. Yet again, I would urge our political leaders to put the people of NI and, most importantly, our children at the centre of what they do rather than their own party politics.

Against this backdrop I am delighted to report that this year we have achieved the best results at GCSE and A level in recent history in the school. With a 100% pass rate for

all exams at GCSE and A level sat, the results this year have been truly outstanding. 81% of our students at A level achieved 3A* to C grades. This key benchmark places us well above the NI grammar average. 78% of all grades were A*, A or B grades. At every level we exceeded the NI grammar average, A*- A, A*- B and A* - C. In LGS we look closely at the "value added" to the grades of each individual student. Based on ALPS data which measures "value added", we are ranked in the top 25% of all schools in the UK with an ALPS score of 2. 11 subjects in the school achieved 100% A - C grades with 18 subjects being above the NI grammar average. An impressive performance! Top achievers at A level were Rhiannon Day, David Irwin and Victoria Brown, each of whom received 3 A* grades whilst Adam Douglas, Ben Kennedy, Joel Boucher, Kornel Gorywoda, Bevin Reilly, John Anderson, Amy Bogle, Eve Craig, John Crown, Shane Murphy, Ethan Squires, Finn Whiteside, Sarah Grant, Stephanie Forsythe and Ryan Duffy all achieved 3 or more A*/A grades. Fiona Matthews has been accepted onto the Deloitte Brightstart Higher Apprenticeship Scheme as an Analyst within the Consulting

Service line in Belfast. This is among the most prestigious, fulfilling and challenging entry-level schemes in the UK, with over 1000 applicants for approximately 40 places.

Lauren McCurry was successful in obtaining a place on the Future Teaching Scholars Programme. This initiative looks for outstanding maths or physics students planning to study a maths or physics-related degree at university and then teach others about their subject.

At AS level the trend continues upwards with our Year 13 students producing excellent grades, with 83.2% of all entries being A to C. 19 pupils achieved the top grade in 3 or more subjects; Josh Boreham, Tim Chan, Kate Dallas, Jessica Gault, Phoebe King, Sophie MacLurg, Jeannie Mark, Rachel Marshall, Ciara McCloskey, Matthew McCool, Tommy Orr, Amber Saggu, Sam Thompson, Kain Breydin, Hannah Cochrane, Austin Hargan, Jack Hockley, Melissa Pattison and Samantha Quinlan.

At GCSE level, results are exceptional! In a year with a new grading system and where the top grades are harder to achieve, LGS students excelled. 98% of all students achieved 5 A* to

C grades with an impressive 95% of boys and girls achieving 7 or more A* to C grades including English and Maths. Girls and boys both achieve highly in LGS unlike the Northern Ireland trends. This has been an area of focus for the school. 50% of all grades were A*/A. At an individual level 44 students achieved 7 or more A*/A grades. These results once again place us above the NI average for grammar schools with seventeen subjects above the NI grammar average. Over the past number of years, we have made significant changes to our assessment methods, use of data, learning and teaching strategies and pastoral structures. We can see the outcome of these changes in the results of 2019. This is an exciting time to be a student in LGS. High expectations are a daily part of school life. These high expectations, alongside a wraparound pastoral care system and an effective reward strategy, lead to the superb results we have achieved. Our students have worked very hard to reach their best and in many cases exceeded their own expectations. We are rightly proud of our students. Results like this do not happen by chance. Our staff go the extra mile to challenge, encourage and support the pupils. I would like you to join me in congratulating our staff and pupils on the excellent results of 2019.

It is our role as a school to provide an environment where our students can excel academically as well as developing a range of other talents whilst having fun. The wealth of extra-curricular activities on offer sets us apart from other schools. School is very busy in the afternoons and on a Saturday morning with extracurricular activities. The learning that takes place on a sports field, school trip or drama performance is equally as important as that which takes place in the classroom. We promote amongst other qualities; leadership, diligence, resilience, respect, compassion, kindness and tolerance. We are a school that is inclusive in every respect: all are valued, and differences are recognized and respected. As we approach 2020 it is important our students are equipped for a global world and a global economy. We were delighted to be awarded the International Schools Award this year as recognition of the international dimension within the school which equips students with a global perspective.

I am going to outline briefly some of the events and successes from last year. There is much more detail relating to the events of last year in the school magazine and I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Warwick and his team for this

wonderful production and to say thank you to all of our sponsors who continue to support us.

The Junior Ski Trip to Italy, the Spanish exchange visit to Madrid, the Physics visit to CERN and Paris, and the rugby trips to the Aviva stadium, all provided learning opportunities, some of them unforgettable! Once such unforgettable experience was the visit to Kenya. In July, the Kenya Trip to Kajiado took place which involved 24 students and 7 staff. Over the course of the year our students raised £40,000 with the help and support of the local community and this afternoon I would like to thank you for your contribution to this. The money raised will be used to fund a series of projects including the building of a kitchen and dining hall for the School

This was the fifth trip to Kenya from our school which has developed a partnership with Kajiado since 2001. The Oloosuyian Girls Secondary School was opened in 2011 with the primary aim of offering local Maasai girls the opportunity of education and to try to prevent them being married off at the age of 10-12 years old. A trip like this changes lives, both of the girls in Kenya but also our students as they experience first- hand the harsh realities of poverty and reflect on our very comfortable lives in Northern Ireland.

During the last year, pupils participated in a range of clubs and societies at lunchtime and after school, including Pottery and Textiles, Law Club, Sign Language Club, STEM, Computing, Technology, Modern Languages, Charity, Board Games, 180, Study Club, Surfing and Photography!

In the UK Maths Challenge, 57 Bronze, 14 Silver and 3 Gold certificates were achieved.

The Music Department provides opportunities for the pupils to develop and refine their talents and love of music. With groups such as the junior choir, senior choir, beginner's guitar, concert band, string

orchestra, traditional group, ukulele orchestra and the rock band, there is something for everyone. The Music Department led us in our Annual Christmas Concert and after Easter we enjoyed a range of musical talent in our Spring Concert. This year as part of a Shared Education project, 152 pupils from LGS, Rossmar, St Patrick's College Dungiven and Gaelcholaiste Dhoire participated in a music technology project in the Nerve Centre.

Junior and senior drama is thriving in LGS. We were all taken "Back to the 80's" in the school musical before Christmas which had sold out audiences every evening singing along to their favourite 80's tunes.

To a full house in June we were wowed and amazed by the talent in LGS (even from the staff) at the end of term talent show. We are looking forward to the stage being set alight by the forthcoming production of Grease at the end of November.

Charity and giving to others forms an important part of our school ethos. Pupils in our Junior school English classes raised £3512 in our Read for Good sponsored read. The money raised helps pay for new books for children in the Royal Belfast Hospital for Sick Children as well as storyteller visits. Throughout the year a number of charity events took place and money was donated to a variety of charities including Operation Christmas Child, the Salvation Army, St Vincent de Paul, Chest, Heart and Stroke, Foyle Hospice and LIPS (Limavady Initiative for the Prevention of Suicide). Promoting positive mental health has been a focus for the year, with pupils taking part in yoga, mindfulness classes, the Twilight Walk organised by the A level PE students, personal development classes and engaging presentations from a range of speakers.

School life is busy with pupils competing in Cricket, Rugby, Hockey, Netball, Athletics, Tennis, Cross Country, Swimming and Football. With more teams than ever before,






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Duke of Edinburgh's Silver Award Winners

Berlin 2019

Our trip began with a very early start and an almost 24-hour day, but we were rewarded with bright and sunny Autumnal weather. First on our itinerary was a comprehensive walking tour of the historical points of interest of this fascinating city, including the Brandenburg Gate, Checkpoint Charlie, the 'Empty Library' and the Memorial to the murdered Jews of Europe. We finished the day with a trip up the famous Berlin TV Tower from where we enjoyed a 360-degree panoramic view of the city at night from an altitude of 368 metres!

Next morning was spent at Berlin's 170-year-old zoo, with more species on display than any other zoo in the world – the hippos were a true

highlight! After lunch, we were fascinated by the delights of the Technik Museum, which included a showcase of Germany's industrial progress plus planes, trains and automobiles. After a delicious Italian meal, we visited the iconic Bundestag Dome on top of the Reichstag Building, the heart of German democracy.

On day three we travelled to Wolfsburg (watching the Rugby World Cup final en route) to explore the innovative Autostadt at Volkswagen HQ. Some of us measured our carbon footprint whilst others learned about sustainability and water waste during food production. The Autostadt boasts 26 pavilions on campus and focuses on car production with demonstrations from Porsche, Lamborghini, Audi and Bugatti. Students were able to trace the development of design in cars from the late 19th century to futuristic concept cars. The whole experience was a master class in German design and efficiency. Wolfsburg is the fifth largest city in Germany but

boasts the highest average earnings: €150,000 per head! We ended the day with dinner in the Sony Centre.

No one could really have anticipated the range of emotions we all felt on our final day as we visited Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp.

There really are no words to describe the impact of the stories we heard about the myriad chilling events which took place there, or our heartfelt reactions as we toured the camp. We all appreciated that the world must be reminded of the horrendous persecution committed by the Nazis, culminating in the Holocaust; and that they should never be repeated.

Sunday afternoon's excursion took us to the iconic Olympic Stadium, where we were able to stand in the place where the Olympic Flame was lit, and where Jesse Owens famously won his four gold medals in 1936.

All in all, this was the most poignant day of our trip and we returned to LGS all the richer for it.

Kenya TRIP

On the 28th of June 2019, 24 pupils from Limavady Grammar set off with seven leaders to experience the trip of a lifetime by going to Kenya for three weeks. We had spent two years preparing for our journey by taking part in team- building days and organising fundraisers to help raise money for this expedition. Our team decided, after much debate, to call itself team S.M.I.L.E, which stood for supporting, motivating and inspiring lifelong education; this summed up the goals we wanted to achieve in Kenya pretty well.

After we bid our families goodbye, we travelled to Dublin Airport for a lengthy flight to Ethiopia. Once in Ethiopia, we had a few hours to stretch our legs before hopping on our second flight, taking us to Nairobi airport in the capital city of Kenya, where we were met by Ronnie and Maggi Briggs who stayed with us and guided us throughout the duration of our trip. We arrived in the town of Kajiado on the 29th and the sight the A.C.K guest house, where we stayed, was a welcome one, especially after having travelled for so long. The next day we walked to the church beside our accommodation for the commissioning service: here the Bishop welcomed us and team SMILE performed songs for the



congregation. During the service we were all overwhelmed by the singing of the Kenyans and the kind welcome we received was simply amazing.

On our third day in Kenya, it was time for us to head to the school and begin our work there. We were all warmly greeted by the Headmistress Mwalimu Joyce, the Oloosuyian girls and their teachers. Our jobs at the school included painting the dormitories, digging trenches for the school's water supply and moving dirt in wheelbarrows in order to make a massive hole for a new canteen to be built. Our team was sorted into different groups to tackle the tasks, and we were joined by the Oloosuyian girls. While we all worked together at the school, each team member was given the opportunity to create amazing relationships with the girls. We did this by sharing songs, dances (the macarena was a big hit!) and telling each other about our families. The culture is very different in Kenya; relationships are far more important than any work. If someone starts a conversation with you, you are expected to drop all work and build a rapport with that person. It was an absolute pleasure to create such close friendships with the girls and I will cherish them forever. During our time at the school, our leaders organised a cultural exchange class where some members of team SMILE and a class of the girls would sit together and talk about our respective traditions and homelife. Jessica Gault and Naomi McCracken showed them Irish Dancing and in return the Kenyan girls danced 'The

Grammur, Schall

Tarantula.' Afterwards we taught the class a few Irish dancing moves and they taught us a song 'Jehovah has the final say', which was so much fun to sing and so catchy that it was stuck in my head all day!

At the Oloosuyian Girls' School, the teachers from LGS taught Maths, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. The girls are used to traditional ways of teaching so our teachers decided to focus on more engaging ways of learning. For instance, Mrs Dunlop encouraged a classroom of girls to run around outside acting out the respiratory system, which they loved. Laura Stewart also held a class of arts and crafts where the girls made a scrapbook about themselves. This was a beautiful idea as art isn't something the girls study at school. Seeing the girls engage so much in their classes really resonated with us, as education is just something we take for granted here: but I know that on coming home, we all had a newfound appreciation for our schooling. After each day at the girls' school, our team returned to our accommodation and spent the rest of the day playing games together and sharing what we had done throughout the day; these conversations went down especially well with Chai tea and some cakes which Maggie would kindly bake for us. In the evening, we would all sit down and enjoy a delicious meal which the guest house had prepared for us. After dinner each night we remained at the table to hear the Facebook comments from our friends and family at home, often having a good laugh at the remarks from some family members.

One afternoon at the school saw us all take part in a very competitive handball game, where LGS competed against the Oloosuyian girls. The stakes were high for the game as the girls' team is the fourth best in Kajiado! Despite only learning how to play handball the day before, Team SMILE held their own and managed to score a 10-10 draw. The handball game was such a fun experience, even for those not playing, because as we watched from the side-lines, the girls braided our hair and we cheered on the athletes. After the match we were still friends (which was a relief!) and we took a huge photo with all of the girls and relished the incredible atmosphere. During afternoon tea we were introduced to the former Bishop, Jeremiah Tama, who was the initial link of the Kenya project back in 2001.

The next day, after yet another early start, team SMILE headed off to Sheldrick's elephant orphanage. What an experience! We never thought we would be offered the opportunity to be within touching distance of thirteen baby elephants. The stories about each elephant were emotional, yet inspiring, because they helped us to appreciate the work that the orphanage carries out. Leaving the elephants, we hopped back on the bus and headed to the first shopping centre. Everyone made a beeline for the market as no one could wait to unveil their haggling skills. Some people were better at the haggling technique than others. Ethan and Eve got their stories straight and managed up to 70% discounts on

each of their purchases - impressive! Purchases included paintings, figurines, jewellery and spears, not to mention one epic African hoodie. It was also lovely to have Wi-Fi back again even for a short while to contact home; but really, while in Kenya, no one missed the Internet too much.

Having spent a week at the school, it was time to say a tearful farewell to our Oloosuyian family. During the short time that we spent at the school, we formed such strong and meaningful friendships. The bonds that have been created will be longlasting and cherished by the whole team. Our leaving service, with the girls, was held in a classroom and we were touched to find beautiful cards with all 31 of the team's names on them. The service was very moving. Each Form came forward to say their own personalised goodbyes, either through dance or song. Reflecting the emotions of the Oloosuyian girls, some of our own team became tearful. As our contribution to the service, we performed a crowd favourite - 'Jehovah has the final say' and the girls happily joined in. It touched us all that the girls valued the time we had spent together as much as we did.

We set off from Kajiado to Oltiasika, where Maggie and Ronnie live, in five safari jeeps. The journey took six hours but it felt like we were on safari with all the animals we saw along the way as we entered the heart of Kenya, including giraffes, zebra, ostriches and gazelles. After arriving at Oltiasika we met with Ronnie and







Maggie who supplied chai tea and delicious cake. We settled into our new homes and the next day the team headed to the local primary school where around 300 Maasai children attend school. There was a presentation of sanitary products and sports kits for the school from team SMILE, all paid for with money raised by fundraising and donations for Kenya. The fun began when the sport commenced with three games of netball, volleyball and handball taking place against the primary school. The kids were all determined to win so all involved had a competitive and fun time. After the sport had finished. the boys returned to clean water in a storage tank for the village while the girls in the team headed back to the school for a cultural exchange.

It was eye- opening and difficult to hear of the challenges facing Maasai girls including body modification and early pregnancy, but we also shared laughs talking about some other differences, including the fact that we keep dogs as pets. What really struck us all was how open and honest they were about discussing some topics that were upsetting to hear. The challenges of the Maasai girls really threw things into stark perspective for us, especially when we were asked what the main challenges in our lives were! It was extremely difficult to answer this as we had just listened to how girls walked 15km to go to primary school and that their education prospects, which ultimately dictate their future, are so limited.

Oltiasika is a beautiful place and so on our penultimate day most of the group decided to go hill walking. The longest hill walk took four hours and along the way, our Maasai guides pointed out lion footprints in the jungle. The view at the top was beautiful and on the way back down, we saw a giraffe only 100 metres away. A Maasai women's market was also organised for us to buy some of their amazing handmade jewellery, and spears for the boys, and it was great to know we were supporting the women who would use the money to provide their children with medicine and food. On our last night, David and Schute, our guides on the hike, roasted a goat they had slaughtered earlier on the bonfire and we had a wonderful meal together. Maggie and Ronnie told us how they had come to be missionaries in Kenya and we quizzed them. Team SMILE also sang songs, and the Maasai women who worked for Maggie in the kitchen sang traditional songs and danced for us which was amazing to hear and see.


After an emotional goodbye from Oltiasika we all got in our jeeps and headed to Amboseli. The journey was long and bumpy, but during it we managed to see much of Kenya's wildlife, including giraffes, ostriches, gazelles, wildebeest and zebras. Upon arrival at Serena Lodge it became immediately apparent that we were going to be in for a treat. Luxurious pools, flavoursome buffets, extravagant rooms and bustling

wildlife welcomed us to our stay at this special resort. After a quick (and cold) dip in the pool we made ready for our first proper game drive in the Amboseli savannah. The whole drive didn't have one single standout moment as it was all so amazing! The evening safari ended with a busy photoshoot at the observation point which overlooks the beautiful African plains and the mighty Kilimanjaro, as the hazy red sun set for the night. The change between staying at Oltiasika and Amboseli was really drastic as we had been so secluded in Oltiasika and after a jeep ride we were suddenly in a hotel swarming with tourists. It was so incredible to have not only seen the commercial side of Kenya, but the part of the country that so few people get to see, which is arguably the best and most authentic part.

The trip to Kenya was absolutely the adventure of a lifetime. Team SMILE was the best group I could have asked for to go on a trip like this with, it was such a pleasure to experience new things every day with them; they became like another family! The work we did at the Oloosuyian Girls' School was so rewarding and the girls taught us to enjoy every moment and live life to the full. Each member of our team took a part of Kenya home with them and we all came back with a new appreciation of life and all that it can bring. The memories we made together could last a lifetime and the friendships we made with the Kenyans are unforgettable. We are all so grateful for the opportunity given to us to go to Kenya and I would like, on behalf of the entire team, to thank all of the staff involved in the preparation of the trip for all their hard work, and to also thank the Kenyans for the kind hospitality they gave us and for all the support we received from everyone back home. Thank you to Mr Purcell, Mrs Given, Mr Hamilton, Mrs Dunlop, Dr Henderson and past pupils Laura Stewart and Alice Purcell for making the trip to Kenya the greatest experience we could have dreamed of.



teenage angst was played with a wonderful tenderness.


His Pink Lady counterpart was the effervescent Frenchy, played by Holly Deane, whose comic timing and enthusiasm were infectious.

This is not an easy role, as the naïve Sandy has flashes of mature insight, along with an eventual transformation into a bombshell, complete with self-assurance and a maturity beyond her years. I loved the sweetness and purity of Lily's voice, and the confident Sandy at the end.

Conor McIlroy-Sanchez never stopped acting from the minute he appeared onstage, until the curtains closed. His performance as Kenickie was dynamite! The choreography of 'Greased Lightnin' was exceptional,

and Conor managed to belt out the iconic tune in character as well! His acting was one of several highlights for me -addictive, powerful and raucous in all the right measures. Bravo, Conor!

"There Are Worse Things I Could Do" was one of the highlights of the evening for me, as Hannah sang it with passion, pain and a vulnerability only seen in accomplished performers. I had goosebumps, a tear in my eye and a lump in my throat! Without a doubt, one of the most moving moments I have witnessed in live theatre.



By now, you must be anticipating comments on 'the weak links' in this show. Newsflash! There weren't any! The minor principals of Miss Lynch (Amy McHugh), Patty Simcox (Suzanne Day), Eugene (Daniel Devenney), the sleazy Vince Fontaine (fab from Kain Breydin), Cha-Cha DiGregorio (Amber Saggu) and the boppin' Johnny Casino (Shay Campbell) were all brilliant. As they carried the narrative in the larger scenes, they were clear, solid and a terrific counterpoint to the main plot. The choreography was phenomenal, particularly in the 'Hand Jive' contest. No matter where you looked, little vignettes were being played out within pairs and groups, often with hilarious effect. The mark of good choreography is in the faces of those dancing: they beamed with delight, as they all manoeuvred their way through the routines. At times, the cast felt like they were moving as

one, floating across our stage with buoyant and infectious enthusiasm.

The back stage crews of lighting, sound and costumes were magnificent-a riot of colour, from beginning to end and the stage team worked effortlessly throughout.

I cannot tell you how much I loved this show. Claire Gordon's direction really highlighted the comedy and gave us plenty to laugh at (and uplift us all), and enabled each of her charges to shine.

Derek Collins' musical direction brought out the very best quality of the vocals - a phenomenal production from start to finish!

I had always wanted to do a skydive, but I hate roller coasters so I didn't think I'd ever actually accomplish it. Then it became a bit of a challenge for me. I overcame my apprehension by booking the jump: it was so expensive that then I felt I had no choice other than to go through with it!

Weren't you scared?

I wasn't nervous leading up to it, but I started to feel frightened just before I had to jump out. After the initial shock it wasn't scary and the view was amazing.

If the parachute hadn't opened, what would your last words have been?

AGHHH!!!

Give us a few details about the jump.

I completed the skydive in Garvagh at the Wild Geese Sky Centre. On the day of the jump I was given a safety briefing with all of the other tandem jumpers, and then had to practise the landing on a harness. The plane ride was 20 minutes long and we jumped out at 13000 feet. The freefall was about 40 seconds long at about 120mph! At 6000feet the parachute was released and the rest of the skydive lasted for about 7 minutes.

Tell us how you felt afterwards.

A bit shocked: but I felt a real sense of accomplishment.
















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


scoring 10 tries with outstanding performances from Joshua Howe and Dylan McAuley. They were then defeated by Rainey 15-3.




The team attended the winter training camp in Portugal at the end of October taking part in a victorious match against local opposition as part of the senior squad.




awards. Mathew Kennedy's tackling ability was impressive and intimidated opposing teams.










UNDER 13

BEST GOAL – We scored many goals this season which all deserve praise, but one sticks



We wouldn't have achieved any of this if it hadn't been for Miss Doherty, Mrs


